

Pedestrian Safety Webinar

What communities can do to mitigate recent increases in the number of pedestrian fatalities



The number of pedestrian deaths has been rising in recent years. What can communities do to turn this around?

Angie Schmitt, author of the book, Right of Way: Race, Class, and the Silent Epidemic of Pedestrian Deaths in America, joined the Smart Growth Network to explain why many pedestrian deaths are avoidable and what communities can do to reframe the problem, make improvements, and help to save lives.

Rethinking Pedestrian Spaces

CMAP looks at how communities are activating public spaces

for a post-pandemic environment



Across northeastern Illinois, many communities have started transforming streets to create attractive and welcoming community spaces. For example, Algonquin in McHenry County transformed its Main Street in its downtown district by adding streetscape features and other amenities, like wider walkways, to make the area safer for pedestrians. Farther away, cities like Barcelona, Spain, have used these designs in a much grander way to create greener spaces that put pedestrians first.

As part of its <u>mobility recovery</u> project, the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP) is examining how the pandemic has changed public spaces in the region and learning from Barcelona and others on how innovation can help make spaces safer and easier for pedestrians.
