## Kane County Board Adopts 2021-2024 Community Health Improvement Plan

Plan sets direction for Action Teams to advance initiatives aimed to improve the health of Kane County Residents



The Kane County Board recently adopted the 2021 - 2024 Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). Four priority areas have been identified in the new plan:

- 1. Access to Health Services
- 2. Behavioral Health
- 3. Immunizations and Infectious Diseases
- 4. Nutrition, Exercise and Weight Management.

Every 3 years, <u>Kane Health Counts</u> conducts a series of community health assessments to identify the County's greatest health concerns. These assessments were conducted at the end of 2020 to provide data to inform the planning process.

Many organizations throughout the county are involved in this planning process; from participating in focus groups to gather data - to taking action with the action teams, partners are involved from start to finish. Kane Health Counts uses the MAPP model, which stands for Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships, to carry out the assessment and planning process.

















The Kane Health Counts funding partners include Advocate Sherman Hospital, AMITA Mercy Medical Center, AMITA Saint Joseph Hospital, Northwestern Medicine Delnor, Rush Copley Medical Center, and the INC Board, the mental health board serving the southern part of the county. The mission of Kane Health Counts is to make Kane County the healthiest county in Illinois. We plan to accomplish this by identifying barriers that affect Social Determinants

of Health and create strategies to address those barriers.

#### **COST FOR TVS AND MONITORS**

- \$25 (for screens under 21" measured diagonally) or
- \$35 (for screens 21" and over).
- Pay onsite with CASH or CARD. or online with card and bring a printed receipt.
- This consumer-based fee is paid directly to the County's



contracted electronics recycler, eWorks, a non-profit that employs people with developmental disabilities.

#### ITEMS ACCEPTED AT KANE COUNTY RECYCLING CENTERS:

All items are FREE to drop off (except for TVs and Monitors, which do have a cost as outlined above).

Electronics: TVs\*, Computers, Monitors\*, Laptops, Phones, Cords, Cables, Servers, Printers, Scanners, Keyboards, Stereos, Speakers, Battery backups, Gaming consoles, Power tools, Holiday lights, and more.

\*See "Costs" above for TVs and monitors.

Books: Hard cover or paperback books of any age, in any condition, for reuse or recycling.

Paper: Magazines, periodicals, brochures, office paper, newspaper, packing paper.

Clothing & Shoes: Clothing items of any kind. Paired shoes of any kind. Accessories, like hats, purses, belts, scarves. Textiles, like sheets, towels, curtains, blankets. These items can be in any condition, even if worn or torn, as long as they are clean. All will be reused or

Scrap Metal: Anything made of metal, like lawn furniture, BBQs, fire pits, pots and pans, hot water tanks, hardware, metal fencing, bed

Cardboard: Corrugated cardboard (flattened).

Shredded Paper: Shredded paper (in paper bags, stapled shut).

Appliances: Household appliances, like washers, dryers, toasters, blenders, vacuums. We do not take freon-containing devices like refrigerators or air-conditioners



One Earth Film Festival (OEFF) is the Midwest's premier environmental film festival, creating opportunities for understanding climate change, sustainability and the power of human involvement. They showcase top-issue, thought-provoking environmental films and lead audiences in interactive post-film discussions focused on solutions.

Films screened during the festival encompass a range of environmental topics and themes that will take viewers around the planet: From "Life at 50 Degrees," which reveals how extreme temperatures around the world are wreaking havoc on nature, forcing climate migration, causing water shortages and triggering dangerous health conditions to "On the Fenceline: A Fight for Clean Air," an urgent call for justice in Philadelphia's low-income communities.

Clean Water for Kane will be sponsoring the virtual screening of *The Inhabitants; And Indigenous Perspective* On Saturday March 12<sup>th</sup>, 2022 at 6:30pm in partnership with the Fox River Ecosystem Partnership (FREP).

Inhabitants follows five Native American Tribes as they restore their relationships to the land using ancient practices that nurture life. As the climate crisis escalates, these time-tested practices of North America's original inhabitants are becoming increasingly essential in a rapidly changing world.
